New Technology Offerings @ Your Library

Digital Learning Stations, LEGO® Robotics, and 3D Printers, oh my!

Digital Learning Stations.

The library added two AWE computers in the Children's Room this year:

The **Early Literacy Station™** is for children ages 2-8, and it features over 70 educational software applications covering several curricular areas. From Math Doodles to Dora the Explorer, there is something special available for every child's learning preference.

After School Edge™ is for children ages 6-12, and it features rich educational software applications that span the entire curricular spectrum, from STEM topics to reading and math to reference and the arts.

As content is licensed and the computers are not attached to the Internet, these

stations provide a safe, secure, and advertisement-free environment in which to learn.

LEGO® Robotics.

The library will be offering **LEGO® Mindstorms EV3** robotics activities for middle-schoolers this year. Robotics is not only fun, but educational, as it teaches basic science and engineering concepts, and offers participants experience in simple programming. Participants also learn to solve problems and work as a team. (The "Robotics on the Run: Build a Simple Robot" program held in August, 2014 attracted 17 young adults in grades 5-12. They are eagerly anticipating attending more robotics programs at the library!)

3D Printers.

The library is going to be getting not one, but two 3D printers!

Technology Librarian Jeff Pike and Library Volunteer Ryan Leonard recommended the purchase of two very different machines. The first is an open source printer, called a RepRap. This printer is for the DIY enthusiast, because rather than shipping all necessary parts, it ships only what is essential and then the user prints the rest!

Ryan has spent many hours this summer gradually putting the machine together. The second 3D printer will be a Mark-Forged Mark One, one of the first 3D printers to print carbon fiber. This unit is on pre-order and is expected to ship this fall.

As we move forward with 3D printing, we are excited to think about the opportunities that this service will present to the community and how it will open a whole new chapter in the history of the Groton Public Library.

The library would not be able to provide any of these new technologies without the generous support of the GPL Endowment Trust.

Library Benefits. We hope you enjoy this newsletter, but more importantly, we hope you have enjoyed one or more of the many delightful programs, services, or special collections the Groton Public Library has been able to offer because of the Endowment.

Financial Health. The financial statement of the Trust as of June 30, 2014, shows assets totaling \$2,288,447. The Trust invests the principal and grants up to 4% each year for special programs and services for the Library. \$65,837 was expended for grants during Fiscal Year 2014, and \$63,329 has already been approved for FY2015.

Continued Support. The GPL Endowment Trust was established in 1996 by people like you – generous citizens and businesses in Groton and surrounding towns. The Groton Public Library cannot continue to excel without the support of its community. We wish to thank everyone who has contributed in the past and to invite everyone to support this vital fund.

It was Full STEAM Ahead @ the Library this Summer!

The Children's Department incorporated **STEAM** (*Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Math*) into its programming for the Summer Reading Program with the theme, "Fizz, Boom, READ!"

573 children joined the Summer Reading Program. Parents and children loved the "set your own reading goal" format, the library bingo game, and the reading prizes. Comments from parents and children:

"The kids felt a sense of pride by setting their own goals."

"Entertainment events were perfect!"

"The prizes motivated my son to keep his reading goal."

5th grader, "I loved everything about the Summer Reading Program!"

"Huge success! Loved the science shows!! Overall great program for the children/community!"

The science theme was a popular one and included many fun and inspiring programs such as Hands-On Science with Kosmic Kelly, a "Singing Scientist" musical science program, robotics expert and author Kathy Ceceri, Museum of Science's Super Cold Science, and visit (with rocket launching!) by Nate Ball, host of PBS's award-winning series *Design Squad* and author of the *Alien in My Pocket* series.

The Endowment also funded other special events: comedic juggler Bryson Lang, Sparky's Puppets, Kid Co interactive theatre, and a musical performance by David Grover. Always a highlight of the summer, the Tanglewood Marionettes enchanted an audience of over 200 with their production of *Cinderella*.

Children's Programs

This year we offered 278 Children's programs and drew a record 6,188 kids, a 12% increase over last year! New this year was the Winter Reading Program for children in grades K-4, "Chill Out and READ!" 100 children signed up and participants who read 4 books during February received a gift bag of prizes, a reading certificate, and a raffle ticket for a \$25 gift card to the Toy Shop of Westford.

Bus Transportation for School Visits

Twenty-three elementary school classes from Florence Roche and Swallow Union (a total of 523 children) visited the library thanks to funding for bus transportation provided by the GPL Endowment Trust.

- **Mini-Motions** classes which included dance and movement for children ages 2-5.
- "Eyes on Owls" live owl program.
- The very popular monthly **Tales & Tunes** music programs for infants, toddlers, and preschoolers.
- Weekly drop-in preschool craft activities.

For the past two years, we've ranked first and second for total young adult program attendance out of the 52 towns our size in the Commonwealth, and last year's attendance – our highest yet! - grew 11% over the previous year!

We couldn't have achieved this level of success without the GPL Endowment Trust's ongoing commitment to teen programming.

Our young adult community is bright, creative, and eager to engage in learning and social activities that the Endowment allows us to provide. We had our first-ever Winter Reading Program this year because teens in the Young Adult Advisory Council asked for it!

They even picked the theme, "Reading is Snow Much Fun!" This summer's "Spark a Reaction" Summer Reading Program invited participants to explore robotics, chemistry, acting, and glass fusion in hands-on workshops, as well as offering the generous reading incentives that teens love. We will continue to offer workshops and ongoing programs that reflect our communities' interests in science, technology, art, and literature.

MUSEUM PASS PROGRAM

The Groton Public Library Endowment Trust generously provides free (or discounted) admission passes to 22 local attractions, where you can escape the endless winter at the New England Aquarium, travel back in time at Old Sturbridge Village, or be amazed by a life-sized T-rex model at the Museum of Science.

Museum passes were used 1,332 times last year, saving our patrons \$33,091! The five most popular passes were to the New England Aquarium, the Museum of Science, the Museum of Fine Arts, the Discovery Museums in Acton, and the Peabody Essex Museum in Salem.

ADULT SUMMER READING PROGRAM

Summer Reading Programs...they're not just for kids and teens anymore!

We introduced an exciting and very popular "Literary Elements" Adult Summer Reading Program this year. Grown-up readers earned raffle tickets for reading or for completing library activities on a bingo card. At the busy Circulation Desk we heard, "What fun!" "It's great that the whole family can do this together!" "We get rewarded for what we love to do...read!"

It doesn't take a rocket scientist to see that the science-themed Adult Summer Reading Program was a big hit! Here are the numbers...

216 people signed up, read 881 books (most books read by one person: 48!), and completed 48 library bingo activity cards! Thirty-nine readers met the Summer Reading Challenge of reading 9 books in 9 weeks. There were 9 weekly raffle winners of \$50 gift certificates to local businesses and one Grand Prize Winner of a \$250 gift certificate to Gibbet Hill.



Groton READS 2014

This was our 10th year and one of our most successful Groton READS yet, as hundreds of residents read and celebrated *The Art Forger* by Barbara Shapiro!

The kick-off event was a bus trip to the Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum for 30 Groton residents, who enjoyed a free trip, group tour, and admission to the special exhibit by Sophie Calle, thanks to the generosity of the GPL Endowment Trust.

Geoff Kelly, the FBI Agent who headed up the Gardner Heist investigation, and the Gardner's Security Director, Anthony Amore, presented "The Gardner Heist" to a completely packed meeting room, as attendees found out first-hand about the largest unsolved art heist in history, and about the efforts to recover the 13 stolen pieces, including masterpieces by Vermeer and Rembrandt – art valued at more than \$500 million.


The grand finale for all Groton READS events was a visit from Barbara Shapiro, who delighted the audience of over 120 people with her wit, humor, and tales from her life as an author.

"It took twenty-five years to become 'an overnight success!'" she said, evoking gales of laughter.

A pop-up Local Artists' Fair in the Library, "A Journey Inside Rembrandt's Paint" by local artist Donald Shambroom, a discussion of *The Art Forger* by the GPL Book Group, an Art Scavenger Hunt in the Library, corresponding books and discussions for older children (*Masterpiece* by Elise Broach) and teens (*Moxie and the Art of Rule Breaking* by Erin Dionne), and a visit from author Erin Dionne on "Boston's History and Mystery" rounded out the rest of our 2014 community-wide reading event.

She is currently the Spanish teacher at the Ayer-Shirley Regional High School. She has led an adult conversational Spanish course on a weekly basis for the Littleton Continuing Education Program for several years. The Spanish Conversation Group meets at 7 p.m. every other Tuesday evening from September through June.

In addition to our Spanish Group, Thomas Knatt continues to lead our wonderful French Conversation Group every other Thursday night at 7 p.m.
