

GROTON READS EVENTS INSPIRED BY SYMPHONY OF SECRETS



The Music of You with Susan Rogers, Sun. March 3 at 2:30 pm via ZOOM

Professor of cognitive neuroscience and former record producer, Susan Rogers presents new research into spontaneous thought processes such as daydreaming that reveals the neural network forming our self-image increases its activity when our minds wander. This same network is also activated when we enjoy our favorite music. Thus, the music we love the most reveals our sense of self and provides a way for us to share ourselves with others.



Stolen—Women Inventors Lost and Found with Bill Thierfelder, Tue. March 5 at 7 pm via ZOOM

Throughout history women have been sidelined, often through lack of opportunity or outright sexism. And many times, women who invented items—from disposable diapers to Monopoly—weren't given credit for their work. Women are responsible for early sketches of the computer, the discovery of the DNA double helix, and even fire escapes. But often men claimed those advancements as their own—or the woman was simply unacknowledged. This program explores 21 things most people don't know were invented or discovered by women.

Her sister, Laura Vernon Crane Burgess, ultimately donated this trove to the New York Public Library, where the collection has been housed since the 1940s. Join local musicolo-
