# **Local Impact of Federal Funding Cuts to Libraries**

On March 14, 2025, the President signed Executive Order 14238, eliminating the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS)—the main source of federal funding for libraries nationwide.

#### In Massachusetts, this change means:

- Annual federal support of \$3.6 million for statewide services has ended.
- Funding for statewide research databases dropped from \$2.2 million to \$500,000.
- As of **July 1, 2025**, many databases are no longer available, though the most-used resources have been preserved—at least for this year.

At the **Groton Public Library**, we are working to fill these gaps. We continue to subscribe to additional resources for Groton residents, including **Hoopla**, **Kanopy**, **Freegal**, **Consumer Reports**, **Ancestry** (in library use only), and more. You can explore all available databases at gpl.org/resources/databases-a-to-z.

Federal funding has also supported:

- Early learning and family programs
- English language and citizenship classes
- Small business and workforce development
- Accessibility services for people with vision loss
- Hands-on learning through museum and cultural centers
- Professional training for librarians across the Commonwealth

While these cuts pose real challenges, we at GPL remain committed to providing access to high-quality resources, learning opportunities, and support for all in our community.







The "People of the Dawnland" (Abenaki/Wabanaki) of the Northeast are the first Indigenous peoples in North America to have had contact with Europeans. Anne Jennison examines how European colonization of North America impacted generations of Abenaki/Wabanaki people and highlights the ways in which the Abenaki/Wabanaki peoples have acted as agents of their own change through education, self-advocacy, efforts to revitalize their languages and traditional arts, and by working with archeologists, anthropologists, and scientists to recover and reveal more about their history and traditional knowledge.




