Groton Connection: A Year of Record Engagement



In-person attendance across all programs topped 20,400 this year, and that's just the beginning! Online engagement skyrocketed, with an astonishing 252% increase in recorded program views after an event for an additional 11,200 views for the year! Plus 5,400 Take & Make kits, and our total all ages program participation surpassed 37,000! These numbers reflect a growing demand for accessible, high-quality programs that strengthen community ties and foster lifelong learning.

We were excited to upgrade our 3D printer to a new Prusa this year! Its user-friendliness and multiple colors have turned a quiet online request process into a hub of innovation, sparking creativity and

new interest among young people. It is in near constant use, creating projects ranging from articulated dragons to custom figurines. It's experiential learning, collaboration, and fun—everything a public library should be!

Children's Summer Reading

Read, Play, and Give Back

This year's redesigned Summer Reading Program combined fun with purpose—and earned wonderful feedback! A total of 509 children joined in, including 406 elementary students and 103 preschoolers.

Community weeks featured craft hours supporting local organizations:

- Fleece blankets for Sterling Animal Shelter

We also hosted exciting programs like Kosmic Kelly and LEGO® glasses, and wrapped up the season with a joyful picnic in Katie's Garden.

Adult Summer Reading

One hundred sixty-four participants signed up for our Summer Reading Program and read 1,700 books! Readers earned prizes, gift cards to local businesses, and even small donations to Loaves & Fishes.

Teen Programs: High Attendance & Participation by Deborah Dowson, Teen Services Librarian

Last year, nearly 3,000 teens attended 200 free programs at the library!

The library remains a top destination for teens—especially on middle school half-days, when scores of young teens flock to our "Llama Lounges" for games, crafts, and socializing. Teens themselves led some of our most popular programs, including Baking Club, 3D Design & Print Club, and Dungeons & Dragons.

Teen volunteers assembled nearly 1,000 kits with instructions and materials for at-home crafts and baking projects. Additionally, more than 200 teens participated in our highly successful reading programs. GPL proudly welcomes and supports all teens—and we deeply appreciate the Endowment's support of these efforts.



Adult Programs: Art, History, and Flexibility

Lifelong Learning: Creativity and Connection

Our lifelong learning series delivered rich experiences in art and history. We explored the fascinating hidden history of Black Boston with Joel Mackall and welcomed local experts Jill Pottle and Kimberly Stoney to lead creative arts workshops. We also brought back two long-running favorites: *Great Decisions* and GPL's memoir writing workshop.



A Groton Treasure: *Diedre* by Mary Minifie



The library recently acquired the exquisite *Diedre* from Mary Minifie, an award-winning painter in the Boston School of Light tradition founded by Groton-born master painter Edmund Tarbell.

This arresting portrait first captivated us while on temporary loan last fall. Patrons and staff alike were struck by how beautifully Mary captured her friend's life and spirit. Deciding we simply could not part with it, we were thrilled to purchase *Diedre* thanks to the Endowment. It now graces our Historical Room as a permanent library treasure.
