- \* The house at 7 Court Street is a front-gabled, 1 1/2-story, 3x2-bay form with elements of the Greek Revival style; a 1-story ell is oriented perpendicular to the main block and contains a secondary entrance under a shed porch
- \* Decorative features are the gable returns, corner boards, molded cornice and frieze board on the eave side
- \* Windows are 6/6 double-hung units with plain trim; the side hall entry also has plain trim
- \* A low brick chimney occupies the southwest slope of the roof
- \* The scale of the house is relatively small compared to houses on nearby Main Street although many on Court Street are of this scale
- \* The house is well-maintained and occupies a small lot just off Main Street

Discuss the history of the building. Explain its associations with local (or state) history. Include uses of the building, and the role(s) the owners occupants played within the community.

The site of 7 Court Street was vacant and Court Street a dead end in 1847, the Railroad not yet having exerted sufficient influence to expand the street network of Groton Center. While the street was in place by 1856, the particular parcel had not yet been developed according to the Walling map of that year. However, by 1875 the resident of the house at this location was N. Priest, about whom little else is known. Mr. Priest's Widow occupied the house according to the 1888 resident directory. Mrs. Spaulding was a subsequent occupant and by 1921, the building remained in use as a domicile. The house is depicted on the 1930 map of Groton but no name is associated with it.
