

Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

\* The house at 19 Court Street has elements of the Gothic Revival style and is built on a 2-story, 2x2-bay plan with a cross gabled roof and modern enclosed shed additions at the front; an attached gabled shed and modern octagonal addition enlarge the plan at the rear

\* Decorative features include the prominent scalloped bargeboard at the eaves, corner pilasters and symmetrical cross-gabled roof

\* Windows are primarily 6/6 double-hung units but 6/1 sash do exist in the front porch

\* The center entry has wide simple trim with a simple molded cap

\* The scale of the house is typical for this section of Groton Center and is one of a small number of buildings with a Gothic Revival style bargeboard

The 1847 map of Groton Center by Caleb Butler indicates the eastern end of Court Street was in place but it had not been built to this point. Indeed, according to Virginia May, the house was moved here in 1875 from Main Street. The owner in 1889 was A. F. Parkhurst according to the Walker atlas. This is Albert F. Parkhurst, an undertaker. By 1930, the owner was G. H. Woods according to the Somes map. This may be George Woods who was a carpenter and lived on Common Street, perhaps renting this property.
