

Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community. * The house at 26 Court Street is a 2 1/2-story Greek Revival style side-gabled form of 4x2 bays with the gable end oriented

toward the street; a 2-story, 4-bay rear ell contains a cut-away porch and expands the plan at the rear parallel to the main block

- * Architectural features consists of the closed gable, corner boards and molded cornice
- * Windows are mainly 6/6 double-hung sash except for those in the upper story of the ell which are 3/3 units
- * The off center entry has classical trim including a cornice, pilasters and sidelights
- * A tall brick chimney rises from the front slope of the roof close to the façade

* The house is of a scale larger than some others on Groton Center side streets; the house is in fair condition and retains most original design features

Discuss the history of the building. Explain its associations with local (or state) history. Include uses of the building, and the role(s) the owners /occupants played within the community.

The 1847 map of Groton Center by Caleb Butler indicates the eastern end of Court Street was in place but it had not been built as far west as the site of 26 Court Street. By 1856, the occupant of the house appears to have been N. Wood who remained until at least 1875. State census information from 1855 lists Nathan Wood as a cabinet maker born in NH c. 1795. He had a wife and daughter. Virginia May states that Mr. Wood also owned the house across the street at 25 Court Street (MHC ###). A subsequent owner was Nathaniel Livermore in 1889 according to the county atlas from that year and to the resident directory of 1888. By 1921, the house's footprint matched the existing form. The house is depicted on the 1930 map of Groton but is not labeled with an owner name.
