

Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

- * The multi-unit residence at 8 Elm Street appears to have at its core a 5x2-bay, side-gabled, 2 1/2-story form of Greek Revival design; this has been enlarged by the addition of a cross-gabled 2-story block projecting south from the façade and north from the rear elevation of the main block and by an addition expanding the rear or west by 3 bays; 2 open porches and one enclosed porch have also been added to the original plan, creating a larger than average residence for the neighborhood
- * Decorative features include the gable returns, corner boards and molded cornice on the main block and Doric columns supporting porches in the cross gabled block
- * Windows are 2/2 double-hung sash with beaded trim
- * The main entry appears to be at the junction of the main block and the cross-gabled block under the open porch; this is flanked by 1/2 length sidelights and pilasters; a screened porch projects off the back the cross gabled block
- * Two brick chimneys rise from the main roof ridge
- * The detached barn has wood clapboard siding, gable returns, molded cornice, a vehicle door, mow door and 6/6 sash in the façade; a metal ventilator occupies the roof ridge
- * The house is larger than average for the area and is well maintained

Discuss the history of the building. Explain its associations with local (or state) history. Include uses of the building, and the role(s) the owners /occupants played within the community.

The 1847 Butler map of Groton center depicts the parcel and building as occupied by L. Whiting, although the current house may have been built after that date given the architectural style. Lemuel Whiting remained at this location until at least 1889 according to maps depicting owner names from 1856, 1875 and 1889. Dr. Green's history of Groton describes Mr. Whiting as being married to his wife Clarissa in 1839 and having two children. State census schedules from 1865 list him as a carpenter. By 1921, the house is depicted on the Sanborn map in the current configuration with an auto house attached to the rear in the existing barn. Porches currently attached to the house were in place by that time. The 1930 owner was G. H. Woods.


