

### ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION

*Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.*

- \* The 5x3-bay, 2 1/2-story, side gabled residence has elements of the Prairie and Colonial Revival styles; a 2-story enclosed porch appears to have been added to the south side; another secondary mass is the open porch over the center entry
- \* Decorative features include the Doric columns supporting the entry porch, gable returns and molded cornice
- \* Windows are 4/1 double hung sash with the upper sash divided into four vertical panes, a style used in (locally rare) Prairie designs from c. 1900-1920; window trim consists of slim hoods above plain surrounds
- \* The well-maintained house is larger than some others in the neighborhood

### HISTORICAL NARRATIVE

*Discuss the history of the building. Explain its associations with local (or state) history. Include uses of the building, and the role(s) the owners /occupants played within the community.*

Previous research by the current owner of the house indicates Kate Delaney may have been the initial owner. Her name appears on the county atlas from 1889 but not in the resident directory from 1888. Albert St Cyr's name is associated with the house on the 1930 Groton map. He is listed in the 1929 resident directory as a mill hand in Forge Village in Westford. Mr. St. Cyr was probably recruited for work in their worsted wool factory by agents of the Abbott Worsted Co. from Quebec like so many other French Canadians whose descendants are now living there.
