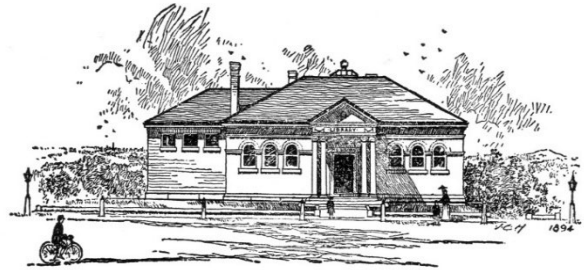
Strategic Plan for Fiscal Years 2026–2030

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INTRODUCTION

It's an incredibly exciting time for public libraries. We are living through significant changes in all areas of life, including libraries. There are incredible possibilities for libraries to shift and reinvent themselves into what their community wants and needs and provide new services in new ways.



Creating a strategic plan every five years is the perfect opportunity to pause and examine the organization from a higher level. We will review what works well, listen to all voices in the community, and assess current and changing needs. Every town is distinctive, and its public library must align with its community while maintaining essential core library services.

We began strategic planning in the fall of 2019 but stopped in March 2020 because of the COVID-19 pandemic. Before restarting, we waited until normal operations resumed, full budgets and staffing were restored, a major technological transition was completed, and an Assistant Director was hired for the first time in the organization's history. We resumed our strategic planning process in the fall of 2023.

Strategic Plans are essential for all organizations, as they provide the framework to assess priorities, review direction, set primary goals and objectives, and outline how we will achieve them. Through our comprehensive gathering of information and feedback, we engaged Library Staff, Library Trustees, Endowment Trustees, many community members, library users, non-library users, and all of Groton. The collected responses have been reviewed carefully to ensure all voices are heard, areas for improvement are identified, and ways to grow and expand together are considered.

This Strategic Plan looks five years ahead through fiscal year 2030. It's been an excellent time to evaluate and identify what we are doing well, where we can improve, and where we are going.

The Library Trustees and Staff are excited to present our new strategic plan to the community. Please let us know if you have any comments or feedback.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Groton, Massachusetts, is a small town known for its quintessential New England beauty and charm, excellent public schools, well-run government, strong community participation and philanthropy, exceptional quality of life, and generous conservation of open spaces.



The Groton Public Library (GPL) has been an essential part of the Groton community for 170 years. Founded in 1854, it is one of the oldest libraries in the Commonwealth. The Library was primarily housed in a room in Town Hall until 1894 when the current building opened. Over 100 years later, in 1999, the 4,000 sq. ft. two-level building quadrupled to the 17,417 sq. ft. three-level beautifully transformed and renovated building we enjoy today.

Located in the Town’s center, GPL has long served as Groton’s center of learning, literacy, creativity, and connection. It has experienced many periods of change—whether the Spanish Flu, Great Depression, post-World War II boom, late 20th-century population growth, internet explosion, technological advancement, information revolution, digital universe, or the COVID pandemic—through it all, GPL has successfully adapted and continued to serve its users.

Responding to the community’s needs identified in the FY2016-2020 strategic plan included a multi-year interior space redesign that created a fantastic new teen area by reducing staff and computer areas. We reduced shelving and opened up lines of sight to provide a more inviting open floor plan with greater seating and work options. GPL extended Sunday hours (the #1 survey request) to be open nine months (instead of four) each year since 2018 (except for COVID-related budget cuts and hiring freezes). We added drive-up book returns, returned adult non-fiction from “neighborhoods” to Dewey Decimal Classification order, expanded digital collections, improved customer service, and increased programming for all ages.

In developing this new Strategic Plan, GPL has completed a comprehensive study of the community’s evolving needs to design the best way forward. This document describes the planning process, summarizes the findings, and shares the final plan for fiscal years 2026-2030.

GROTON, MA COMMUNITY PROFILE

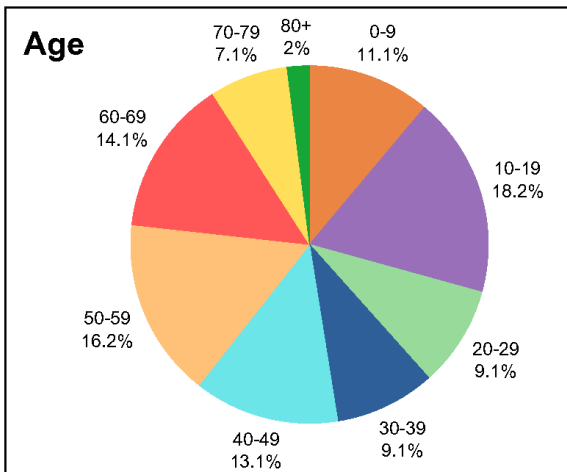

Groton is home to two prestigious private preparatory schools, Groton School and Lawrence Academy, the world's largest Shirdi Sai Temple outside of India, and the world-class Groton Hill Music Center.

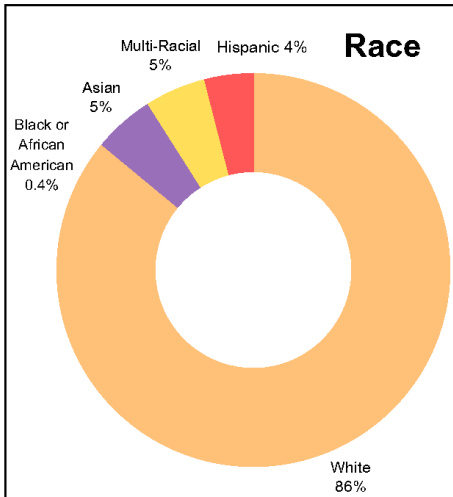

GROTON PUBLIC LIBRARY PROFILE

Founded in 1854, the Groton Public Library (GPL) in Groton, MA is the 8th oldest public library in the state. GPL is certified every year by the MA Board of Library Commissioners and is a member of the Merrimack Valley Library Consortium. GPL is open 48 hours a week year-round (52 hours per week Sept-May) serving a town of 11,315 residents. It has a staff of 28 (11.625 FTE). The library building underwent an extensive renovation and expansion in 1999 and currently consists of 17,417 square feet with 3 floors. It has one study room and three meeting rooms.

OUR PLANNING PROCESS

In the Fall of 2019 and again in the Fall of 2023, we hired Barbara Alevras of Sage Consulting Services to guide us through the planning process, facilitate meetings and focus groups, and help conduct community surveys.

After establishing the information we wanted to gather, Library Staff and Trustees brainstormed questions and challenges, identified stakeholders to engage, and created a detailed process (see *Appendix A—GPL Strategic Planning Project Flowchart 2023-24*). We also compiled important background information about the Library and the Groton community.

In October 2023, a 14-member Strategic Planning Advisory Committee (SPAC) was formed with Library Staff and nine community members representing various constituencies.

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

A thorough review of all the data provided many insights into community perceptions of GPL and ideas for improvements. We received numerous suggestions and creative ideas for how the GPL can better meet its community's wants and needs going forward.



The data shows that while our users are overwhelmingly satisfied with GPL's staff, services, programs, and facility, there are also some areas for improvement. Here are some areas GPL should focus on as we plan for the future:

- **COLLECTIONS:** There is a high demand for increasing digital collections and shortening wait times. Our users also want more physical copies of bestselling "hot" titles, reduced wait times, more large print, and updates to adult non-fiction collections. Parents asked for decodable books for kids as a popular reading instruction method used by schools.
- **FACILITY:** The building and grounds are described as clean and beautiful. There is definite interest in additional study and meeting rooms and a place for people to take a call or participate in a virtual meeting away from open areas. Noise is an issue for many, especially during after-school hours, even in the designated Quiet Area, which shares an open floor plan with the Teen Area. A dedicated space specifically for older, school-aged kids was a highly popular request for the Children's Room.
- **ACCESS:** Road access was a major concern, particularly during flooding events that close Broadmeadow Road, GPL's sole access point. Residents also inquired if it was okay to exit through a private section of Playground Road owned by Lawrence Academy. Also, a number of people wanted more parking and a more spacious lot for greater ease of us.
- **MARKETING:** There is a need for much-improved communication. Many are unaware of all the GPL offers, including the higher profile services such as museum passes, digital collections, and the Library of Things. Community members identified direct mailings and social media as the most effective ways to communicate library information to the Town.

- **PARTNERSHIPS & OUTREACH:** Many want a more vigorous community outreach program and greater coordination and partnerships with schools, town departments, community groups, local businesses and non-profits, and the local community center.
- **OPERATIONS:** Sunday hours remain the best time for many to visit the Library, as expressed in our 2015 survey. If GPL could expand service hours, summer Sundays would be the top choice. While opening 9-10 am was the least popular option at 10%, there were several impassioned pleas from parents and remote workers to open earlier.

- **PROGRAMS:** There were many programming suggestions and numerous requests to schedule more children’s and family programs at nontraditional times, such as evenings and weekends. Several respondents asked for more events and gatherings for homeschoolers.
- **SERVICES:** Many respondents want a robust and relatively comprehensive Library of Things to borrow. We also need to make our current offerings much more visible.
- **TECHNOLOGY:** Our Wi-Fi needs substantive improvement in speed, capacity, strength, and ease of use. Several respondents said they don’t find our redesigned website easy to navigate. As essential library services, both must work optimally and intuitively.

In all feedback collected, GPL Staff were highly valued and praised for their friendliness and helpfulness. GPL Staff listed management, the Board of Trustees, and the Town as key GPL strengths. While all GPL departments and Staff earned top ratings, many write-in comments expressed heartfelt appreciation and love for GPL’s Children’s Room and its Staff in particular.
