Brink of War? The US, Iran, and the Middle East, Tuesday, Oct. 29 at 7 pm VIRTUAL





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Answers to Frequently Asked Questions:

Q: Is Broadmeadow Road closed when it floods?

A: Yes, Broadmeadow Road is closed to thru traffic when it floods. However, access to the Library from Main Street is always open. You'll see a new street sign soon: "Road Closed—Open to Library."

Q: Can I drive through Playground Road?

A: Yes, you can use Playground Road to exit to Main Street. Although the top portion is private property belonging to Lawrence Academy, there's a historical right of way for access.

Q: Can't find what you're looking for on our website?

A: Use the search box and switch from "catalog" to "website" for broader search results.

Q: How's the Wi-Fi working?

A: We've recently improved our Wi-Fi. Please share your feedback on how it's working for you!

Q: Why are the waitlists so long for digital materials?

- **A:** Publishers sometimes make it difficult for libraries to offer ebooks and audiobooks. Here's why:
- **Higher costs:** Libraries often pay 5-10 times more for titles than individual consumers.
- Limited checkouts: Restricted number of checkouts—and once used, we have to repurchase the title.
- One user at a time: Platforms like OverDrive/Libby only allow one user per title, leading to waitlists.

What We're Doing About It: The Massachusetts Library Association is working with Representative Ruth Balser on Bill H.3239 to address these issues and ensure fair practices for libraries.

Tips for Finding Digital Materials:

- Place holds in Libby: Libraries often buy more copies based on demand.
- Try Hoopla or Kanopy: These platforms offer instant access to many titles.
- Borrow from other libraries: Your MVLC library card works with other Mass. library systems on Libby/OverDrive.
- Boston Public Library eCard: Mass. residents can use BPL's digital collections with a free eCard (bpl.org/ecard).
