Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

- * The house at 97 is a Second Empire style, 2 1/2-story, 3x3-bay cross-gambrel form with a 2-story rear ell and attached barn; the upper section of the roof is a gabled form; the lower pitch of the Mansard roof has an inverted bell curve; the façade is a front gambrel form; a wrap-around porch with eave trim similar to that on the house covers the first story on the south and east elevations
- * Decorative features are the paneled corner pilasters, paired brackets and molded cornices at the eave and at the junction of the two roof slopes
- * Windows are mainly 2/2 double-hung sash with round-topped dormers in the upper story of the side elevations; window trim is beaded and includes slim hood moldings; openings in the first story of the façade are extended in length
- * The side-hall entry has relatively simple beaded trim
- * A single brick chimney rises from the core of the plan
- * The rear ell is composed of a 2-story flat-roofed section against the rear of the house connecting to the barn; this was added after initial construction according to the current owner
- * The barn has a Mansard roof with a gambrel wall gable in the facade; access is through a central rolling vehicle door; additional openings in the principal elevation contain 2/2 double-hung sash, pedestrian door and mow door; a molded cornice separates the 2 roof slopes here as well as on the house; siding is vertical flushboard
- * The house is in good condition and is very similar in form, design and scale to those at 96 and 111 Hollis Street

The 1875 Beers atlas indicates a vacant parcel but the 1889 Walker atlasd shows the house in place, suggesting a construction date of c. 1880. The initial owner of the house at 97 Hollis Street was I. M. Mansur in 1889 according to the county atlas from that year. The 1888 resident directory lists Melvin I. Mansur, possibly indicating a transcription error, as a farmer living on Hollis Street. The owners in 1930 were some relatives named Frederick Mansur and his wife Mary who are listed as residents of rooms Street.
