

* The store at 157 Main Street is a 2 1/2-story, 4x2-bay, side-gabled form with elements of the Federal style; the plan of the main block of the building is enlarged by the rear ell

* The property is articulated mainly by the symmetrical fenestration in the facade

* Windows are mainly 8/12 double hung units with beaded trim except those on the first story of the façade which are fixed pane display windows

* The main entry is recessed between the display windows and lacks ornament

* The building is well-maintained and is built on a scale typical for Groton Center; it one of several buildings that appears to have had a residential function replaced by a principally commercial use sometime early in the 20th century

Discuss the history of the building. Explain its associations with local (or state) history. Include uses of the building, and the role(s) the owners /occupants played within the community.

The initial owner of the house at 157 Main Street, built c. 1850, was George Brigham Jr. (born in Groton, 1813) who also owned the shop at 155 Main Street (MHC# 351). State census schedules from 1855 list the senior George Brigham (born c. 1785 and occupant of 153 Main Street, MHC #7) as a harness maker and the younger George D. Brigham (born c. 1813) as a merchant occupying the same dwelling despite the 1856 map which shows them as living separately at 153 and 157 Main Street. Mr. Brigham owned the house at 157 Main Street until at least 1889 according to county atlases from 1875 and 1889. Mr. Brigham served as town clerk from 1855-1892, justice of the peace in 1879 and 1886, married his wife Mary Jane in 1837 and had 8 children. He died 1892 in his house as a result of a fall from a ladder and, according to Dr. Green, may have been the best - known man in town, always kind and obliging. The 1921 Sanborn map indicates the house had an alternate use that may have been a confectioner's shop. The 1930 was Mrs. H. H. Woods. Resident directories list Harold H. Woods a wool broker in Boston.


