

* The house at 102 Pepperell Road is a Victorian Eclectic style, front-gabled design of 2 1/2 stories and 3x3 bays; the first story of the façade is covered by a full width porch with a flat roof; a gable roofed 3-sided gabled bay expands the plan at the south side elevation; a hipped dormer lights the attic level on the south roof slope; the shed is a 1-story, side-gabled form attached to the northeast corner of the house

* Decorative features include the patterned wood shingles in the façade and south bay gable peaks, corner pilasters, prominent frieze board, gable returns and molded cornice

* Windows are typically 2/2 double-hung sash with hoods; additional types include the paired 1/1 sash in the front gable peak

* The attached shed is a side gabled form with central vehicle door and two double hung windows in the façade; decorative elements include the corner boards, low pediment and wall gable over the vehicle door

* The detached wood shingle tower in the south side yard is of undetermined use; The four-sided structure has battered walls rising around 15 feet to a low pyramidal hipped roof

* The house and shed are well-maintained and resemble other Victorian examples in the neighborhood in terms of scale, design quality and materials; it is particularly similar to the houses at 17 and 39 Pepperell Road

The house is not depicted on the 1889 Middlesex County atlas which suggests a construction date shortly after publication. The 1930 map of Groton may depict Kate E. Thompson's heirs as the owners. Little is known of Ms. Thompson.

The Victorian Eclectic Style house at 102 Pepperell Road is potentially eligible for the National Register of Historic Places at the local level. The first known owners were the heirs Kate E. Thompson whose ownership is reflected on the 1930 map of Groton. The design of the building's architectural details including the patterned wood shingles in the façade and south bay gable peaks, corner pilasters, prominent frieze board, gable returns and molded cornice make the property eligible under Criterion C. The house retains integrity of design, materials, setting and workmanship.
