

Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

* The Victorian Eclectic style, three by three bay, front-gabled form rises two and one-half stories

* A hipped porch covers the first story of the façade; rear ells of two stories and one story expand the plan at the rear

* Decorative elements include the square posts with caps supporting the porch, paneled corner boards, gable returns and molded eave trim

* Windows are mainly 1/1 double-hung sash except for the sash in the front gable peak which is a 2/2 unit

* The side-hall entry is flanked by pilasters

* Tall brick chimneys occupy the west slope of the main roof and of the first ell

* The detached wood clapboard barn northeast of the house appears to have been built in the 19th century and has a vehicle door, mow door and two 6/6 sashes in the façade; corner boards and gable returns match those on the house

* The house is in excellent condition and retains historic exterior fabric and architectural details; the scale and materials are typical for houses on side streets in Groton Center; the barn is one of approximately two dozen examples in the village

The site of 37 School Street appears to be occupied in 1847 by the house of O. R. Blood and by 1856, Mrs. Shattuck lived here. This may have been Emeline Shattuck who lived alone, worked as a housekeeper and remained until at least 1875 according to the Beers county atlas. The Walker county atlas shows B. Harrington as the owner. By 1921, the detached barn was in use as an auto house. The 1930 owner was Frederick O. Porter who sold provisions at his store on Hollis Street.
