Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community. * The house at 45 School Street is a Victorian Eclectic style, 2 1/2-story, side-gabled form of 3x2 bays with a perpendicular rear ell of 2 stories; A modern addition exists at the east side of the ell and an enclosed porch on the east side of the main block; a Colonial Revival style open front porch covers the center entry; a 1-story bay window occupies the west bay of the first story of the facade * Decorative features include the gable returns, corner boards, molded cornice and Doric columns supporting the entry porch * Windows are mainly 2/1 double-hung sash with plain trim except in the modern addition which has 6/6 sash; The center entry has sidelights and plain trim flanking the door * A single brick chimney rises from the east end of the roof ridge * The ell appears to serve as funeral reception space * The house is well-maintained and is larger than some others on side streets in Groton Center

The house at 45 School Street appears to have been built c. 1875 when it is labeled on the Beers atlas as the estate of A. H. Fuller. The building depicted on the atlas with something near its current footprint. A subsequent owner was Edwin A. Shattuck and his wife Mary from at least 1918 to 1930 according to resident directories and the 1930 Groton map. Mr. Shattuck was listed as a coal dealer in the 1918 resident directory. He and his wife Mary remained here until at least 1930 according to the Groton map of that year.
