

BUILDING FORM
ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION
* The 2-story, 3x5-bay brick building has a low-pitched front-gabled form with elements of the Colonial Revival and Panel Brick styles; A 1-story addition of 2 bays has been made on the northeast side * Details include the prominent molded cornice and closed pediment, spandrel panels below the second story windows that have raised limestone panels within, first-story corner quoins rendered in brick and a slightly recessed panel framing the second story of the façade * Windows appear to be modern replacement double-hung sash that have limestone sills and lintels; the lunette in the gable peak has a limestone sill and brick arched top * Access is through a pedestrian door and two overhead doors in the main block and two additional overhead doors in the 1-story addition; overhead doors may have been a later alteration * The former Odd Fellows Hall is in fair condition and has been significantly altered with the addition of vehicle bays, new sash and modern bay on the northeast
HISTORICAL NARRATIVE i see continuation sheets

The International Order of Odd Fellows had been meeting in Groton since 1908 according to the authors of "Groton at 350". After fire destroyed the previous meeting hall in February of 1915, the group hired the architect Daniel H. Woodbury of Boston to design a new brick building. Mr. Woodbury (1893-1936) also had a residence in nearby Littleton and had worked on the Unitarian Church there in 1905. The current building was built of hollow tile faced with brick and limestone trim. According to contemporary accounts, the first floor included a kitchen and was to be rented for social gatherings. The second floor served as the Lodge Room and retains this appearance today with the stage in the rear of the hall and an otherwise open plan. The building was in use by late September, 1915 according to the Groton Landmark newspaper. Alterations in 1940 allowed for its current use as a fire station, one of three in Groton.


